



Dual Enrollment Program – English and Social Studies

(Subject to change as the partnership between MVCTC and Wright State University grows.)

The MVCTC and Wright State University (WSU) are partnering to deliver college courses on the MVCTC campus during the school day. Dual enrollment is **not** Post Secondary Enrollment Option (PSEO). Dual enrollment allows students the opportunity to remain on the MVCTC campus, take a college level course, and earn **both** high school and college credit. When a student is enrolled as a dual-enrollment student, s/he is also a student at the college, where s/he has the same benefits as any other Wright State University student. **English and Economics course descriptions and additional prerequisites are located on the back of this flyer.**

ELIGIBILITY:

To be eligible for Wright State University dual-enrollment courses, students must have:

- Senior status with a 2.5 or greater GPA
- Successful completion of placement requirements
- Parent permission
- Willingness to accept the challenge and rigor of a college course
- Internet access at home recommended
- Willingness to pay reduced tuition for the course (actual tuition cost will be determined in Spring 2012)
- Completion of the college application process
- MVCTC and WSU deadlines met
- Have paid all MVCTC fees

COURSES OFFERED:

ENGLISH 1100 - Academic Writing and Reading (offered during the first high school semester)

ENGLISH 2040 – Great Books: Literature (offered during the second high school semester)

Student must have passed ENG 1100 with a 'C' or better to be permitted to enroll in ENG 2040.

ECONOMICS 200 - Economic Life (offered during the first high school semester)

Part of the Ohio Transfer Module (General Education Requirement but does not fulfill the economics requirements for Business majors) EC 200 is taken online from a WSU Lake Campus professor but meets daily at MVCTC with a licensed high school teacher. Textbooks are supplied but may be purchased as well as a subscription to the *Wall Street Journal*. Depending on your home school, EC 200 can be combined with Government 2nd semester

All WSU DEP courses are:

- Part of the Ohio Transfer Module (General Education Requirement) if taken for college credit
- ½ high school credit; 3 semester hours college credit
- Textbooks supplied but may be purchased

ENGLISH:

Academic Writing & Reading (ENG 1100, 1st semester) 3 Semester Hours

This course is a dual-enrollment option for seniors who meet the prerequisites. It is a part of the Transfer Module, fulfills a General Education Requirement, and may require a significant investment for tuition. Students must expect a substantial amount of homework and must make a serious commitment to doing schoolwork outside the school day. The course introduces students to principles of effective written communication and critical reading at a college level of difficulty. The curriculum stresses invention, drafting, revising, editing, and self-assessment along with effective critiquing and collaborating. Students will also receive ½ credit of high school English upon successful completion of the WSU course and some high school-level assignments.

Great Books: Literature (ENG 2040, 2nd semester) 3 Semester Hours

This course is a dual-enrollment option for seniors who meet the prerequisites, including passing Academic Writing and Reading (See above.) with a grade of “C” or better at the college level. It is a part of the Transfer Module, fulfills a General Education Requirement, and may require a significant investment for tuition. Students must expect a substantial amount of homework and must make a serious commitment to doing schoolwork outside the school day. The course introduces students to the critical reading of literary text within the broad western culture and literary tradition. It introduces students to the discipline of writing critically and thoughtfully about literature. Students will also receive ½ credit of high school English upon successful completion of the WSU course and some high school-level assignments.

ECONOMICS:

Economics Life (EC 200, 1st semester) 3 Semester Hours

This course is a dual-enrollment option for seniors who meet the prerequisites. It is a part of the Transfer Module, fulfills a General Education Requirement, and may require a significant investment for tuition. (EC 2000 does not fulfill the economics requirement for WSU business majors.) Students must expect a substantial amount of homework, make a serious commitment to doing schoolwork outside the school day, and realize that this is an online, writing-intensive course. Students begin the course studying a WSU textbook and interacting with a WSU professor online for the 15-week WSU semester. WSU course content includes introduction to basic economic concepts such as resource allocation, costs, supply, demand, and public goods. Topics include American capitalism, market failures, unemployment, inflation, and taxation. For the balance of the high school semester, students study high school-level content including the economics and financial literacy topics required by the Ohio Core. Students will receive ½ credit of high school economics upon successful completion of the WSU course and the high school-level assignments. (Second semester students study the high school-level government required for graduation.)
